

CRAFTS OF PRESERVATION

Earlier in the year, we launched the HERFA+ initiative aiming to provide the local community with a platform that nurtured and spotlighted their remarkable craftsmanship.

With the support of the Dulani Business Center of the Social Development Bank and the Council of NGOs in Tabuk, the initiative empowered local artists through intensive training programs and incentives that offered them the chance to finally see their skills flourish.

Their passion for preserving the region's legacy through traditional handicrafts was met with heartwarming excitement at a 5-day bazaar at Tabuk's Park Mall specially prepared to display their works and transform their talents from mostly part-time hobbies to financially rewarding local design brands that would then sustain their incomes and help them prosper.

Throughout the initiative's run, and the exposure that the participating artists benefited from in NEOM's communities, during the Saudi National Day, as well as in OXAGON, they amassed a total revenue of more than 150,000 Saudi Riyals, kickstarting the careers that they have been dreaming of.

WEAVING TRADITION

Choice of dress, be it one of conscious deliberation or accidental chance, often reflects an uncanny resemblance of the wearer's daily habits, societal influences, and aesthetic tastes. The distinct nuances of this reflection are ordinarily overlooked; but for Taghreed AlAnzi, they have been the constant guiding force behind each of her creations.

A Tabuk native and lifelong resident, her interest in fashion came into being at a young age and quickly defined her upbringing. This passion grew to the point where she could never bring herself to buy one of the ready-made abayas lined up in droves along the city's storefronts. This did not stem from a lack of decisiveness — in fact, it was quite the opposite. She may not have known exactly how to phrase it with the specific terminology of the field of fashion design at the time, but she just knew there was more to it all.

Taghreed began learning about the field, taking closer looks at how these abayas were made and with what materials. The more she learned, the better she could put into words her aversion to mass-produced abayas. Once she understood the intricate details of the design and production processes, how the fabrics differed greatly in character, and how purely aesthetic appearances tended to overshadow attention to quality, it became clear to her why she felt so strongly about this field — and why she wanted to make a name for herself within it.

decision. She had
already amassed
a decent following
through her social
media platforms
before the initiative
was launched, but she
saw great value in the

benefits that the program promised. While her social media presence was a solid beginning to her journey, Taghreed still felt like there was more that she needed to do to truly push her passion and business to the next level. Herfa+ gave her the opportunity to do exactly that.

Throughout the ten days of training, the

counselors and trainers helped give her the focus she needed to hone her craft and ensure that every detail of her designs was given the attention it deserved. What she benefited the most from, however, was how the program gave her the confidence to step out in front of the crowds of people that swarmed the Tabuk Park Mall during the five-day bazaar. The program solidified her presence in a physical space, and her place as a noteworthy Saudi fashion designer.

The farther we travel along this journey, and as more glimpses of the future increase in clarity, the more we feel the need for connections — the more we realize that friendships seem vital to fulfillment.

Therefore, we tried to embrace the necessity of creating these relationships through platforms that deliver positive social and environmental impact. We found that fostering a sense of volunteerism in our community was a great way to build the friendships we needed.

This sentiment was key in uniting us to pick up the pieces of dreams that we all carried individually and put them all together. These connections built a community of reliable guides who offered us the comfort of good advice and the reflection of good example.

FRIENDSHIPS

NEOM Friends is a platform we launched to nurture the exceptional people around us who we have come to see as the family that we can truly rely on to bring the future closer for the benefit of all.

They shared their interests with others and found the program a useful springboard to find pathways to a number of opportunities that enhanced their skills and allowed them to gain professional experience and training. We also utilized the community we built to bring help to those who needed it most.

We joined forces with local charity organizations during the month of Ramadan to provide food baskets to the area's families in need. Our community helped in donating and packaging the baskets, and then went on to distribute them across the region.

It was also imperative that we understand the troubles that local students face to address their educational needs and support their learning to make sure they can thrive in an environment that enables their success. For the 2021 academic year, we distributed environmentally friendly and sustainable school kits to students registered in a number of local charity organizations and in Tanmiah, the National Program for Community Development.

The school kits contained a number of supplies and stationery that the students needed, like pens, crayons, notebooks, pencil cases, lunch boxes, water bottles, and sketchbooks. We also created cultural and educational brochures that informed students of several places of interest in the region and the extraordinary wildlife that inhabit it.

Moreover, to ensure the safety and well-being of our local community in the Tabuk region, we took the initiative to distribute 2,500 winter kits that provided them with nine essential items that eased any difficulties in bearing with the colder Tabuk weather. From winter clothing to electric heaters, the kits were given out to families in need across the region. As with the school kits, we made sure that each winter kit was produced locally and with the environment in mind through the use of sustainable materials.

The foundation of our responsibility to every member of our local community stems from an unyielding aim to ensure each individual receives equal access to rewarding opportunities through quality education. Through providing necessary means for the region's people to unlock their potential and venture on gratifying journeys of self-discovery, we hope to pave a way for them to find the courage to fulfill their dreams.



ESSENTIALS

In continuation of our past efforts through the years in offering educational programs that further develop the members of the local community, the fifth iteration of the English Language & Information Technology program was held in cooperation with the Fahad bin Sultan University.

The program consisted of a thorough six-week training course that serves students living across the Tabuk region, from Sharma, Gayal, and Al-Khuraybah, to Maqna and Al-Bad'.

Prior to the beginning of the course, placement tests were conducted to evaluate students and place them in appropriate tracks specifically designed to target areas of growth in developing their skills in the English language and in information technology. Once placements were determined, the six weeks that followed helped students sharpen their abilities and unlock paths to employment opportunities within NEOM's sectors and partner companies.



EXPRESSIONS OF POTENTIAL

Taking the first step toward distinctive jobs that allow learned skills to flourish is often an obstacle for many. Further empowering the local community to make use of employment opportunities and advancing their capabilities to adequately identify ways of expressing their potential to employers, we organized a **Resume Writing** program that eased entry into the workforce.

The initiative helped job seekers not only craft compelling and professional resumes that better reflected their abilities and efforts, but also acquire the knowledge to properly comprehend and analyze which elements employers tend to be on the lookout for in such documents. By training them how to better write their resumes and how to assess those of others, we hope that they in turn transfer what they learned to the rest of the local community who might have much to say about their abilities but may be unable to effectively communicate that potential to others.

A robust platform for **Careers at NEOM** was also created to help better provide the community with accessible paths to exciting job positions with NEOM and our partners. Applicants are given the opportunity to undergo specific training that advances their abilities and qualifies them for the jobs they seek through the platform.



GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE

An initiative that we at NEOM hold dear to our hearts, and which marked the beginning of our commitment to bring quality education in all its forms to the local community, is the NEOM Ambassadors program. Established in order to enable high school graduates to fulfill their potential, achieve economic mobility, improve their quality of life, and fully share the rewards of the sustainable society that NEOM works on nurturing, the program consists of transformative educational and training programs.



To ease access into the program for all students of the NEOM and Tabuk regions, the preparatory Enrichment Program supports high school students in developing their skills and enhances their educational levels in order to have a higher chance of completing the scholarship admission test.

Entry into the NEOM Ambassadors program

opens the door for the region's students to obtain degrees from the world's best academic institutions.

In cooperation with Tabuk's Fahad bin Sultan University, students begin their journey with an orientation program that offers a balanced mixture of academic preparation, leadership skills development, and multicultural immersion. Participating students are encouraged to major in academic fields considered vital to their development in parallel to the benefit of the local community and to the progress toward the completion of the city of NEOM. Students are free to pursue a variety of academic fields including, but not limited to, aerospace engineering, airport operation management, artificial intelligence, medical biotechnology, archeology, hospitality, and tourism. Upon graduation, students will then be offered the opportunity to translate the valuable knowledge they gained into a full-time position with one of NEOM's partners, contractors, or sectors.

SHAPING IDENTITY

The current advancements occurring in Saudi Arabia instilled in her an enthusiasm toward sustainable living, and she finally felt like she was on the right path when she chose to major in business sustainability at Arizona State University.

She wanted to be part of this great change, and not only look at it from the sidelines. Her love for her country, in combination with her eagerness toward her education and the opportunity presented to her by the NEOM Ambassadors initiative, shaped Mohrah's identity as a flourishing student today and an aspiring contributor to a sustainable tomorrow.

Making sure that the training courses and scholarship opportunities offered to the local community truly benefit them is of vital importance to their success, which is why we also focused on giving them the chance to apply their learnings in more hands-on professional and memorable settings.


PROFESSIONAL INTEGRATION

Changes in setting have quite a unique influence over language, even when the change may not seem of much significance at first. However, a great number of students who have been taught specific ways to use language in a classroom setting might be caught off guard when these ways no longer apply in the real world. It is a frequent occurrence that the **NEOM Business Skills Development** program set out to address.

Through intensive and advanced training methods conducted by experts in the field, and with a particular emphasis on business terminology, practical grammatical competence, and fundamental presentation techniques, trainees were introduced and acquainted with the conventions that govern language usage in professional contexts.

PREPARING FOR THE FUTURE

The undeniable necessity to understand and embrace the integration of technology in our daily interactions and life prompted us to partner with the Ministry of Communications and Information Technology to extend the benefits of the Future Skills initiative to the local community.

A program which seeks to provide a sustainable environment that equips them with the tools required to meet the needs of today's digital world, participants take part in hands-on technical courses that enhance their readiness to enter the workforce. Tackling modern and emerging technologies, the program is made up of several focus areas including web application development, the basics of programming, business analysis, Internet of Things, network development, artificial intelligence, cybersecurity, user experience design, and cloud computing.

DIGITAL TRANSFORMATION

Targeting fifty graduates in the region of Tabuk, the Digital Champions **Program** was launched in cooperation with the Saudi Digital Academy to develop the digital capabilities of our community in new and emerging fields and technologies. Specialized training modules in fields of modern technologies aimed to qualify participants for specific rewarding job positions during the course of the six-month program.

Prefacing the Fourth
Industrial Revolution, it is an effort to keep pace with digital transformation advancements in the information and communications technology sector and prepare the local community to not only adapt to these developments, but also excel within them and spearhead an evolution of their own.

REACHING FOR MORE

Ever since she was young, Samira AlAtawi never cared much about studying — she cared so little that she failed a great deal of it. While trying to get herself through middle school, she got married to a teacher eleven years older than her with a mahr of just one Saudi riyal. Her father did say, however, that her husband would complete her intermediary and secondary education.

After the marriage, her husband did his part in completing her education as was required of him. Right when Samira began continuing her studies, she gave birth to her first child. This made her quit school. A year later, her husband insisted that she should get back to school and finish. Considering her role as a wife and a mother, pursuing studies in housewifery seemed relevant at the time. One term in, she guit that too. A year later, her husband insisted yet again. One term in, she quit again. This instilled a certainty in her that she did not want to continue her education at all.

Soon after her fourth child, her husband was diagnosed with a heart condition. He never stopped thinking about her education - even more so after the diagnosis. "Samira, I won't be here for long... you have to have goals for yourself." She never cared. She had a husband, a house, and her children. To be a good wife and a good mother — this was her goal. This went on for 1 riyal?" he replied, placing her hand in his. twelve years.

A day came when her husband decided to stop waiting for her and just enroll her himself in a school for illiterate students. She could see how excited he was doing it, and the look of pride he had on his face every time she got ready for school after enrolling. His enthusiasm was shortly something she started to

feel herself.

Her classes had gotten difficult during those years, but she would ask for her husband's help whenever she struggled and he would explain everything to her and help her through it all. "Samira, you can do this," he would encourage her. "Samira, I see you as a great woman who deserves so much more." His words instilled in her a strength that kept her moving forward, and she finally graduated.

Feeling an incredible sense of pride, she applied to several universities but was consistently met with rejections due to her

age. Samira was thirty-five at the time. Her husband kept consoling her, and one day came to her with a piece of paper in his hand. He had come across a call for applications to the Fahad bin Sultan University, and there was no condition regarding the applicant's age. "But isn't it private?" she asked. "Wasn't your mahr just She nodded. "Then just consider this your actual mahr. You're not stopping now. I believe in you."

> After a period of five years of working toward a bachelor's degree, she graduated in 2019 as an engineer. Proud of what she had accomplished, she began her search for a job. Every job opportunity she found was accompanied by the

condition that the applicant must be younger than forty years old. Samira had just turned forty.

"Samira, don't let this discourage you. You deserve even better than all these jobs you're looking at," her husband continued to give her hope. At some point during her search, applications for the cybersecurity track part of NEOM's Digital Champions Program opened. She applied, not thinking much of it; that she should be rejected anyway because of her age.

A call came a few days later. "Samira AlAtawi?" "Yes?"

"You've been nominated for acceptance into the program at NEOM."

She broke down in tears. Her interview was scheduled for two days later. She decided it would be best if she were to immediately state her age when interviewed. Being upfront about it — she thought — would be her safest bet in case they later find out and feel that she had been somehow dishonest with them.

On the day of the interview, she walked into the room and stood before three professors. Before any of them could speak, she blurted out her age. "I'm forty, and I'm proud of myself for getting to this stage and standing in front of you." A brief moment of silence followed her confession, quickly disrupted by the applause of one of the professors who had stood up from his seat. "We are the ones proud of you."

Samira began her new journey as a promising trainee in the Digital Champions Program, aiming to gain the necessary qualifications that she hoped would help her secure the job position she had been longing for.

As she was studying the night before one of her exams, she received a call from her husband whose shift at work was moved to

the nighttime due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. He had gotten quite ill, and they had to spend the night at the hospital as he was tested by the medical staff. He kept pleading with her, "Samira, my will is that you don't quit working on your career. You're ambitious, and I want you to keep going and keep reaching for more. Keep going and don't ever stop."

A week had gone by with her traveling back and forth from her home to her training and the hospital, struggling to make sense of the situation she was in and trying to balance her studies, her children, and her sick husband. A call came a few days later. Her husband had succumbed to the illness. She shortly tested positive for the virus and began her quarantine and her 'iddah at the same time — "the hardest time of my life."

The Eid break came to an end, and so an announcement was sent to Samira and the other trainees of the Digital Champions Program calling for their return to the campus. Samira's 'iddah (a period of four months and ten days) was nowhere near done by then. "Keep going and don't ever stop," her husband's last words to her echoed in her mind. She prayed for forgiveness and decided that she had to honor her late husband's wishes. Continuing her training, she hopes that her efforts thus far will lead her to a job that makes it all worth it. "This is my hope, this is my ambition, and this is my husband's will."

06 Expectations

In search of sufficient ways to respond to inquires concerning one's identity, specifically questions that are largely broad in nature — "Who are you?" — we found through our interactions with members of the local community a widespread need to share several personal stories in order to adequately convey who they were. General questions tended to really make them think up a narrative that accurately represents them, while more focused ones were answered with ease.

EXPECTATIONS

The intricate narratives they weaved outlined precisely how they perceived their place in the community and in the vastness of the reality that held them. It was fascinating getting to hear how they so fluently interpreted their identities as reflections of what they were capable (and incapable) of doing, and of what they felt was expected of them — expectations that were cast on them by others primarily based on their capabilities. This was the primary factor that defined how they recognized themselves, and how others recognized them as well.

As a means to remedy this often debilitating method of recognition, we strive to stand by those who show resilience and persistently aim higher, and those who shatter all expectations.



CULTIVATING APPRECIATION



Famed for its moderate climate and for the fertility of its soil, the region of Tabuk — and thus the majority of its people's lives — is substantially influenced by its suitability for prosperous agriculture.

A driving force behind the steady maturation of the region's agricultural sector over the past thirty years has unquestionably been the Prince Fahad bin Sultan Model Farm Award, a symbol for recognition that cultivates a fruitful culture of appreciation amongst the local community and its hard-working farmers.

This annual award incentivizes local farmers to diversify their production, employ cutting-edge greenhouse technologies, and implement a range of sustainable solutions that greatly benefit them and the region as a whole. An essential component in promoting the agricultural sector in the Tabuk region by instilling in its farmers a competitive spirit integral to the acceleration of advancements in the field and the growth of the local economy, NEOM partnered with the Tabuk Agricultural Development Company for the award's latest iteration.



CLAIMING RECOGNITION

Talent and skill know no bounds. A quick look at some of the most prominent figures in our history shows a great number of extraordinary people who conquered staggering difficulties and continue to influence every aspect of our lives to this day.

In aims to foster a world in which talent outshines handicap, in which art is accessible to all, and in which each and every individual receives the undying support to make positive lasting impact, we joined the **Ammar Award** to empower Gulf talents with disabilities and pave the way for them to thrive.

An initiative that strives to showcase incredible untapped potential where least expected, the award shines a light on these resilient talents and champions them through a platform of global recognition and lifechanging development and support programs.

In cooperation with the AlEradah Organization for Talented People with Disability, NEOM and Ammar Award honored those who harnessed their creativity in spite of their disabilities, as well as those who took care of them and gave them the necessary encouragement to persevere.













A PORTRAIT OF PASSION

The moment in which the diagnosis was made carried with it a disturbance of indescribable magnitude; a shock that would surely reverberate in each moment of the young girl's life. Then again, despite its gravity, it was an event that was shortly eclipsed by events of even greater importance — all of which could be attributed to the girl's ingrained desire to communicate.

Iman Guffa's challenges were brought on by a rare muscle condition known as Ullrich Congenital Muscular Dystrophy, which weakens the body's muscles considerably. It was when she first began painting in 2018 — just eleven years old then — that she felt as if the condition's symptoms faded into the background, and all she was left with was the canvas that faced her and a seemingly foreign sense of calm. To project her being onto the canvas, she believed it would only be an accurate portrayal of herself if she used an artistic medium that she thought would best suit her. During the period of the 2020 COVID-19 lockdown in the Kingdom, Iman taught herself techniques in charcoal drawing.



She committed herself to completing one sketch a day and took the time to grasp the detailed hatching and blending skills that the medium demanded, deliberately using her eraser to create highlights in the shaded portions of the canvas that added depth and character to her art. She kept practicing until she figured out exactly how to capture the essence of color through the variety of tonal values within the monochromatic medium, and how to create pieces of art that beamed with the rich intensity and boldness of the black charcoal.

When the opportunity opened up for her to showcase the abilities that she had grown proud of, she joined the Ammar Award with the goal of showing everyone that nothing was impossible — that no matter what stands in the way, no one should feel

so discouraged to not even try. While she was proud of what she had accomplished as a self-taught fourteen-year-old artist, it was not until she was met with the judges' continued encouragement that she sensed her ambitions grew even wider.

The experience excited her and made her more determined to continue putting in the effort to improve her skills and achieve much more. Despite her admirable third-place finish and the success she has found thus far at such a young age, Iman still thinks of herself as merely a beginner who has an even greater future ahead of her.

07 Beyond

We hope, through these wider partnerships, that we can provide the people of Tabuk opportunities to step beyond the region's boundaries and excel on a nationwide level while carrying the name of their hometown with pride.

SPARKING LIGHT

An innovative six-week training program led by MISK Foundation in partnership with NEOM and Monsha'at, and endorsed by the Global Entrepreneurship Network in Saudi Arabia, SPARK is designed to foster an entrepreneurial spirit among the Kingdom's youth.

Its curriculum exposes participants to the critical steps involved in starting a business and equips them with the tools necessary to turn bright ideas to viable businesses. Upon acceptance into the program, participants will learn more on how to develop successful business ideas, how to raise funds for their venture, and how to effectively launch a startup in a hypercompetitive market.

SPREADING CHANGE

Under the nationwide initiative "Attaa Digital" headed by the Ministry of Communications and Information Technology, CyberX is an online platform dedicated to raising cyber awareness in the Arabic language.

Aiming to grow social and professional digital knowledge through awareness campaigns, training platforms, and skill development courses in cybersecurity, the program includes a four-week internship course through which participants gain

practical and applied skills, and experiences that qualify them to take up job roles in the Information and Communications Technology industry.

Making use of the award-winning Project Ares platform, the initiative immersed participants in a virtual learning experience with a number of gamified activities and competitions that encourage progression and ensure that learned skills can easily transfer directly to the workplace.

NEOM sponsored three programs under the CyberX initiative. The first of which, Bootcamp for Youth: Al & Machine Learning, engaged 50 participants with activities that allowed them to explore and experiment with machine learning, and unleash their imagination and creative skills. The second program, the Bootcamp for Youth & Adults: Building Capabilities in Cybersecurity, introduced 16k participants to a wide range of topics regarding cybersecurity and the field of cryptography. Last but not least, the Cyber-Mission-X Competition: Gamification


was held in which 400 competitors qualified through an initial round of over 600 registrations and competed across four stages of challenges pertaining evolving online and gaming cyber threats. The highly competitive program saw three winners come out on top.

We take pride in our sponsorship of the Saudi national team's participation in the World Robot Summit, a global competitive event that aims to accelerate technological developments through advanced robotics. This marked the first time that a team from the Kingdom participated in a global robotics competition.

Led by the Research Products Development Company, the national team competed with 119 teams from around the world in the Industrial Robotics category. The team successfully qualified to the competition's final stage held in the Aichi Prefecture city of Tokoname in Japan — a testament to the notable talent of the Tabuk region and its people.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED

of evolution and innovation. Tackling the applications and development of robotics in industrial sectors and manufacturing in particular, the "Assembly Challenge" calls on participants to essentially teach machines to meet the new demands of an ever-evolving manufacturing industry.

Successfully completing these challenges calls for an ambition that transcends all limitations, and a sense of inspiring collaboration. Tabuk's Meshal Al-Harbi realized in himself a desire to seek the answers that our developing world requested. Dr. Noha Ahmed Al-Harthi, the team lead of the technology and digital sector at NEOM, took note of his ambitions and followed through on NEOM's goal to support and develop the Kingdom's youth. Meshal was given all the support he needed to exceed even his own expectations and was eventually asked to join the first Saudi team to ever participate in the World Robot Summit and represent the nation and the region of Tabuk.

Carrying the ambitions and dreams of Saudi youth on their shoulder to compete at a global level in an event of this scale, Meshal and his team, led by the Saudi Research Products Development Company, pushed forward to an impressive sixth-place finish in a challenge attended by 119 nations. Having just joined NEOM's training program for nine months at that point, Meshal stands as a notable example of the incredible local talents just waiting to be given the chance to shine on a global stage.
